Building Work at Oaklands School

A very ambitious building project is currently well underway at Oaklands.

The rear double-storey extension has been designed to increase the size of the hall by 75%. Next to the new hall



there will be a new library, and underneath the hall on the new lower ground floor will be a large specialist classroom that will accommodate a new Science and/or ICT Suite.



The front double-storey extension will create a new lobby entrance, new

toilets and a covered waiting area. There will also be a new large classroom built above the entrance lobby.

The wasteland at the bottom of the school field is being transformed into car-park and drop-off area, and already looks unrecognisable.

In addition to all of these projects, the Lower Kindergarten is being enlarged and reshaped over the summer break, with a new outside play area that will be more conducive to free flow learning. A few other minor improvements will be made around the site.

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Sports Days

Some of the biggest events in the school calendars are our Sports Days, held in either May or June. We were lucky enough to have perfect weather for all of the Sports Day this year, and they were events enjoyed by crowds of pupils, family, and teachers.

The whole of Braeside gathered at the Lee Valley Athletics Centre ready for their events. The older pupils took part in a range of sprint, long distance and relay races with some very fast times recorded. The Juniors enjoyed taking part in their obstacle and egg and spoon races before getting a little more competitive and running in the short sprints. It was lovely to see the older pupils helping some of the younger children across the finish line. Once all of the results from the afternoon were counted up, it was announced that Mason House were the overall winners!


This was a wonderful day and we hope
