Earlier in the month a panel of judges visited the art exhibition at Loughton Gallery hosted by Braeside School and Normanhurst School to select winning artworks. The judges were extremely impressed with the standard of work at the exhibition.

Year 7 Flower Dissection

Year 7 continue their Biology lessons on the topic of ecosystems. They are learning about flowers and pollination, therefore to further their knowledge they dissected roses to observe the male and female parts

they contain.

Some of the pupils were surprised to find both male and female parts inside



each flower and that insects were needed in order for pollination to occur. They then went on to compare the features of insect pollinated flowers and wind pollinated plants.

The whole school gathered together on Wednesday 21 February to raise money for their chosen charity, Action Aid. The four Houses, Bronte, Fry, Nightingale and Mason all took part with different activities including a cake sale, and a variety of games including 'Splat the Rat' and 'Guess how many sweets in the jar'. The hall was buzzing as pupils and staff gave change in exchange for snacks and fun competitions. Science Live

On Friday 2 February Year 11 pupils travelled to the Apollo Victoria to take part in 'Science Live!' a series of annual events for GCSE Science pupils around the UK.

The show began with Professor Jim Al-Khalili encouraging the pupils to consider the real possibility of time travel and how, although it might sound far-fetched, it can be explained by Physics, using Einstein's theories of relativity.



Professor Lord Winston showed everyone images and videos of embryos developing and they learned about the ethical considerations that are required of the future generation due to genetic enhancement possibilities.

The class received tips for GCSE examination success from a GCSE examiner. Example tips for success were to revise (even for 5 minutes) after each lesson and to practice the calculations. The new Science GCSE papers all contain an element of mathematics and pupils need to show all their working out in a logical sequence on the



paper as this can gain them valuable marks. For the questions on 'Required Practicals' pupils need to remember that they may be asked all sorts of questions relating to practical tasks, such as how to assess risks, calculate, draw conclusions and evaluate data and methodology.

Dr Maggie Aderin-Pocock (current presenter of BBC Four's "Sky at Night") talked about her journey from a dyslexic underachiever at school to a successful scientist. Her message was to have crazy dreams, work hard and take every opportunity given to you.

The day finished with a bang. Professor Andrea Sella of UCL showed the audience how they could melt dry ice if the pressure was high, only to explode the container in a very dramatic and loud demonstration!

The last week of February is a very special week. People all over the world celebrate the power of books and reading. Year 5 had a particular focus on the fairy tale of 'The Elves and the Shoemaker'.

As part of their studies, they began work
