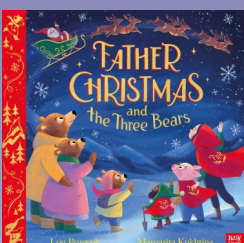
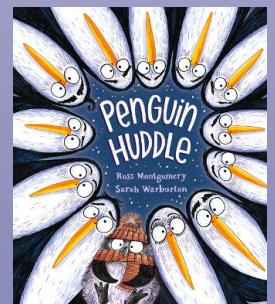


The Jolly Christmas Postman by Janet and Allan Ahlberg

I have actually bought a copy of this book for Kindergarten and Reception to enjoy over the next few weeks. It has been a firm favorite in homes and schools over the festive period. This is the 'Christmas' version of the classic story The Jolly Christmas Postman. It has postcards, puzzles, letters and various other 'pull out' items in the post. It's a mix of fairy tales and wonder.

Penguin Huddle by Ross Montgomery

This is a new book suggested for Early Years children by The Book Trust. The Book Trust say: A charming and playful picture book told with humour and heart from the brilliant team behind Ten Delicious Teachers. The penguin pack play all day long. 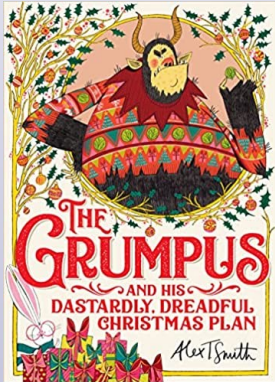
Father Christmas and The Three Bears by Lou Peacock

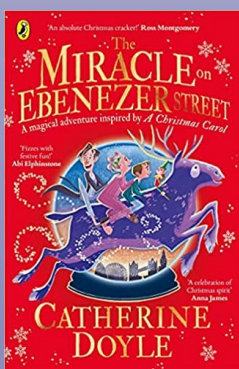
Winter Tales - by Dawn Casey

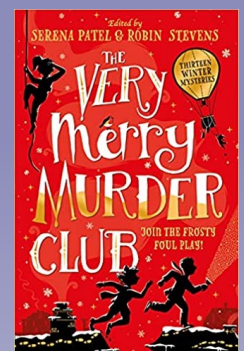

A collection of wintry crime and mystery stories by thirteen of the most exciting and diverse authors in children's books today!

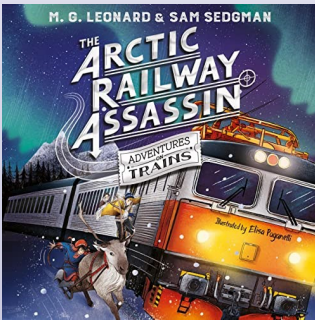

The second, and standalone, novel by the multiple award-nominated and bestselling author Finbar Hawkins does not disappoint. Stone is a compelling study of grief, thought and family, suitable for KS3 and KS4 book clubs and fans of Norse myths and Halloween. Good, evil, magic, tarot mysticism and a mysterious girl with the key to Sam's fate await in this bewitching novel with a refreshing splash of darkness.

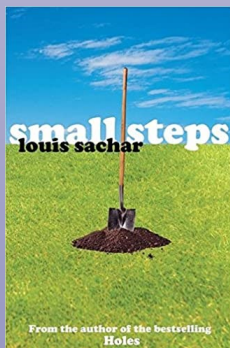
Freedom (1783) - By Catherine Johnson

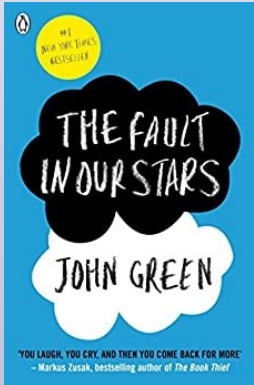

I fell in love the way you fall asleep: slowly, then all at once.

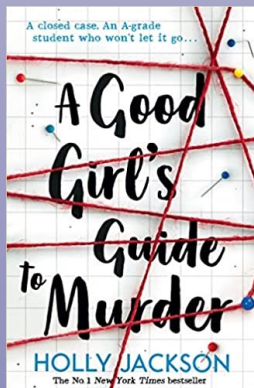
