




## The King's Pants by Nicholas Allan

#### **Boom Bang! Royal Meringue by Sally Doran and Rachel Saunders**






### The Boy who would be King by Michael Morpurgo


#### The Fox and the Ghost King by Michael Morpurgo

### The Head that wears the Crown by Emma Wright and Rachel Piercey (Poetry)

Which King trained his pet monkey to give rude gestures? Which ruthless Queen enjoyed toasting people to a crisp? Whose reign lasted only nine days? The Head That Wears A Crown is a captivating collection that features the Kings and Queens of the British Isles as youve never seen them before. Read Queen Victorias Twitter posts and young Elizabeth Is letters to her fathers latest wife. Hear the muddy marching song of King Harolds soldiers and learn which royal was Danish as a pastry, but nothing like as sweet! Intriguing, comical and accompanied by fascinating historical facts, these vibrant poems are a joy to read, bringing a long line of daring and devious monarchs to life.

#### Kings and Queens by Eleanor and Herbert Farjeon (Poetry)

Kings and Queens by Eleanor and Herbert Farjeon is a highly entertaining collection of poems about all forty-one English Kings and Queens since William I. Reissued in Puffin Poetry Kings and Queens is an authentic classic that has delighted young readers and adults alike. With wonderfully witty illustrations by Robin Jacques, history has never been so much fun!





### Treason by Berlie Doherty


Will Montague is a page to Prince Edward, son of King Henry VIII. As the King's favourite, Will gains many enemies in Court. His enemies convince the King that Will's father has committed treason and he is thrown into Newgate Prison. Will flees Hampton Court and goes into hiding in the back streets of London. Lost and in mortal danger, he is rescued by a poor boy, Nick Drew. Together they must brave imprisonment and death as they embark on a great adventure to set Will's father free.

#### The Executioner's Daughter by Jane Hardstaff

Thrilling adventure set in the underbelly of the Tower of London and on the Thames in Tudor times


Moss hates her life. As the daughter of the Executioner in the Tower of London, it's her job to catch the heads in her basket after her father has chopped them off. She dreams of leaving, but they are prisoners with no way out.

#### Half a King by Joe Abercrombie

Prince Yarvi never wanted, or expected, to be king. His withered hand means he cannot grip a shield or swing a sword but when his father and brother are killed he must shoulder his responsibilities and lead his people.

When intrigue and betrayal snatch the throne from him and cast him into the icy waters of the Shattered Sea, Yarvi swears revenge on the perpetrators. But what can he do from the confines of a slave ship where the physical and mental hardship are overwhelming?


From the first page, Yarvi's story, set in a vividly imagined fantasy world, is gripping, fast-paced and hard to put down. Explores complex questions of morality, loyalty and obligation.

#### Children of Blood and Bone by Tomi Adeyemi

Magic has gone from the world, vanished when Zelie's mother was violently murdered by the King's men. Now the Maji clans, marked out by their silver hair, live in constant fear. Zelie longs to rebel, but her chance doesn't come until she finds herself having to protect a runaway princess, Amari, who is carrying a scroll that can bring magic back to the world.

The girls should be on opposite sides of this bitter war, driven by Amari's father and brother, but instead they join forces in a desperate race to get the scroll to its rightful place, and restore magic to the world.

Adeyemi has created a thrilling rollercoaster ride of a book, set in a fantasy world based in African tradition. This book is likely to appeal to readers who enjoyed Eragon, Devil's Kiss or the successful film Black Panther.

# Years 10 and 11





## Ash Princess by Laura Sebastian

While many royal weddings are a happy and buoyant affair, many crowns come at a price, and such is the case for Theo, who was given the shameful title of Ash Princess after her mother's murder and made a prisoner in her own palace. After years of abuse from the Kaiser and his court, Theo does the unthinkable and ends up with blood on her hands. With intrigue, treachery, and the marks of an epic, Sebastian's new series is for those seeking a royal heroine who upends the traditional happily-ever-after stories.

# A River of Royal Blood by Amanda Joy

Young adult readers who enjoy cutthroat royalty stories will love this royalty-inspired fantasy about sisterhood, power, and choice. With the throne of their queendom up for grabs, princesses and sisters Eva and Isa must fight to the death. The winner gets the crown; the loser goes to the grave. This novel is unlike anything you've ever read!
